above through

row separated

Through: Through means to go in one side and out the other or opposite side.

We went <u>through</u> the doorway and into the classroom.

Prompt: Have students think of things that they can go through (tunnel, doorway, lunch line, etc).

Name some objects that have holes that go through them (e.g. beads, life savers, buttons, etc)

Have students draw lines through a shape you have drawn on the board.

Separated: Separated means to keep apart or not together.

The teacher asked us to keep the red blocks and the blue blocks <u>separated</u>. Prompt:

Have students put their hands together, tell them to make them look separated. Have a group of objects, have a few apart from the group, ask which items are separated from the group.

Visual example of words running together and then words that are separated for proper spacing in handwriting.

Above: Above means up or over something.

The ceiling is <u>above</u> our heads.

Prompt:

Draw a shape on the board, have student write name above it.
Have student put hands above their head, foot, nose.

Ask student to name something that is above their head.

Row: Something placed next to each other in a straight line.

The seats on the bus are in a <u>row</u>.

Prompt:

Have student line objects up in a row.

Have students sit in rows.

Have student write numbers in a row.

Have student point to a row on the 100s chart if you use one.
